Note: This is described on its website as a "one of a kind leadership program." It is a competitive, cohort-based program. The contact person for the program, Mary Drago, frequently attends the SEAC conference.

Duke University/Kenan Institute

Note: The Kean Institute offers both a course-based and experiential certificate program. The Experiential Ethics Certificate requires "two different experiential components totaling / 50 hours of work" (150 hours of research plus 300 hours of community-based field experiences).

Alaska/Anchorage

Note: This is a Community Engagement Certificate program. It is worth reviewing to see how the program is structured and how it is explained. For example, "[t]he Certificate appears on student transcripts and attest to the students' engagement in campus and community life. Future employers value the broad civic perspective and practical skills and knowledge of Certificate graduates."

Course-based (no community engagement required)

Webster University, Certificate in Practical and Interdisciplinary Ethics

Note: This looks more like a minor than accertificate program. It is a way to provide students with an opportunity to "identify a concentration in the study of ethics."

Oregon State, Certificate in Applied Ethics

Northern Illinois University

American University, Certificate in Applied Ethics and Professional Responsibility

University of Colorado

When do we reach a "critical mass" of EI and CE courses to enable us to move ahead with the program?

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EAC Director Job Description (Draft) – January 2014

Summary

The Director of Ethics across the Curriculum (EAC) oversees the planning and implementation of EAC initiatives. The Director's primary responsibilities include: serving as course coordinator for FYS112 and campus coordinator for the Mars Hill Ethics Bowl team, directing faculty development efforts to support ethics-related courses and research initiatives, planning and coordinating an annual Ethics Lecture series, developing and maintaining a process for designating courses as Ethics-intensive, and developing and overseeing the operation of an Ethic Certificate program.

Course Coordinator for FYS 112

Recruit instructors, manage assessment efforts, provide coordination among the sections during each semester (including weekly team meetings), develop and maintain a Moodle page in support of FYS 112, and provide leadership for faculty development efforts (May workshop, Boot Camp in Ethical Theory, periodic norming/assessment meetings, etc.)

Faculty Development (EAC)

Plan and coordinate workshops, book discussions, and other appropriate faculty development efforts (webinars, ethics-related conferences, etc.)

Campus Coordinator (Mars Hill Ethics Bowl Team)

Recruit and train students, develop and maintain a Moodle page, facilitate regular meetings, provide appropriate resource and training materials, handle travel details for Ethics Bowl competitions

Ethics Lecture Series

Plan and coordinate an annual Ethics Lecture series (identify speakers, coordinate ancillary programming to supplement Ethics Lecture series, manage logistical details associated with programming

Ethics-intensive courses

1. FYS 112

a. Along with the Dean of General Education, recruit two (2) instructors who have not previously taught FYS 112 to do so and reactivate two (2) who have taught previously but are not doing so in the Spring 2016 Semester.

Measure: Instructors recruited and reactivated.

b. Identify/re-identify a core of ethical content/vocabulary for inclusion in all sections of FYS 112, while offering flexible and creative teaching strategies for inclusion of that material.

Measure: Core identified and teaching strategies included in ongoing training.

2. Support Conversations about Ethics on Campus

Identify and offer collaboration with events and presentations on campus which provide opportunities for conversations and learning about ethical issues affecting our campus. Examples include, but not limited to: academic integrity, race, gender, sexuality and sexual orientation.

Measure: Co-sponsorship or provision of significant support for two (2) initiatives, not originated solely by EAC.

3. Faculty Development

Expand participation in ethics instruction development opportunities for faculty, especially in the Spring EAC-sponsored workshop.

Measure: Increased participation over previous years.

Initial Impressions:

Since getting the opportunity to offer leadership and coordination to the Ethics Across the Curriculum initiative, I've gathered information about the work that has been in process, had discussions with people who've been involved in EAC efforts (or who might be willing to be involved), and formed *some initial impressions*:

- MHU has effectively put ethics in the curriculum, with FYS 112, the revamping of some ethics classes into I and I offerings (REL 341 and GE 320, for instance) and the requirement that all Business majors take BA/PHI 330 or an approved equivalent. There might be other majors which require an ethics course; these are the ones of which I have direct knowledge.
- Ethics in the curriculum is not, of course, the same as ethics across the curriculum. There are many remaining possibilities for encouraging genuine multi-disciplinary approaches to the study of ethics, as well as for encouraging and helping teachers to make explicit the implicit ethical issues in their respective disciplines. If we take "writing across the curriculum" as a rough analogy, there is room for fuller integration of ethical instruction into more of the course offerings at MHU. Whatever approach we might or might not take to encourage that fuller integration, it would have to be respectful of teachers' prerogatives in their own courses and classrooms. The best way, I think, is through simply providing faculty development and practical (inexpensive or no cost) resources.
- I'm particularly interested in Ethics across the Campus—or "across the implicit curriculum." How can we make ethical awareness and practice more a part of the MHU culture? Supporting and extending efforts like the implementation of the Academic Integrity Policy, Constitution Day/Week, discussion of race and class (as with the Hoffman Fund discussion Virginia Bowers is convening), and conversations about gender and sexual identity seem particularly crucial for our campus. I'd like for EAC to play a catalytic and visible role in those kinds of efforts, doing whatever we can to make them more genuinely campus-wide.
